The Conservation, management and interpretation of cemeteries

A two day skills development workshop focusing on practical issues of identifying and managing the heritage values of cemeteries and graves.

Date: 29-31 August 2013

Venues: Sir Roland Wilson Building, Australian National University and at selected cemeteries and

burial locations in the ACT and region.

Cost: \$660 (incl. GST) for 2 days including course materials, morning and afternoon teas and

lunches on each day.

Details: This skills development workshop focuses on building awareness and understanding of the

particular issues faced in the conservation of cemeteries and the features commonly found in cemeteries. Cemeteries potentially have a wide range of heritage values, including to specific groups within the community that make them potentially complex sites for

heritage conservation.

This workshop is based in the Canberra region and includes on-site discussion of conservation methods, practical issues and management approaches at a range of cemeteries. The course will visit locations that illustrate cemetery types from an 19th century churchyard cemetery, cemeteries on rural holdings and an 20th century cemetery. Issues of Aboriginal burials will also be discussed considering one known burial in the ACT region as well as examples from elsewhere in Australia.

The course will be presented by heritage practitioners experienced in the conservation of cemeteries.

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Course aims:

The aims of this workshop are to build skills in participants in relation to:

- 1. understanding the wide range of heritage values potentially associated with cemeteries and methods for documenting and understanding those values;
- 2. selecting and reviewing suitable recording and documentation approaches for cemeteries;
- 3. knowledge of the range of conservation and management issues found in different cemetery contexts;
- 4. understanding the key physical conservation issues affecting graves and cemeteries
- 5. understanding and applying existing principles and guidelines to the conservation of cemeteries;
- 6. awareness of the range of different options for the presentation, interpretation and use of cemeteries; and
- 7. On-site skills in working on cemetery and grave sites in the field.

Target Audiences

The skills development workshop will be suitable for anyone interested in developing a deeper understanding and up-to-date knowledge of heritage conservation approaches to cemeteries. Specific audiences that would benefit from attending are:

- Officers of local government authorities and other organisations with the responsibility for cemetery management;
- Heritage consultants undertaking work for cemetery, heritage or local government authorities;
- State and territory heritage agency staff responsible for heritage listings and strategies that include cemeteries;
- Staff of Commonwealth or state/territory agencies that manage properties or protected areas with cemeteries or grave sites;
- Students in heritage conservation interested in developing a deeper understanding of a specific aspect of heritage practice;
- Staff from Indigenous groups, land councils or other organisations with an interest in cemetery and grave conservation and management; and
- Members of the public interested in the history, heritage and care of cemeteries.

Program convener



David Young

David Young OAM is a heritage consultant specialising in building materials conservation. With a background in geology he has been involved in the diagnosis and repair of historic buildings and sites for over twenty five years, with a particular focus on those of stone. David is an Adjunct Associate Professor in Cultural Heritage Management at the University of Canberra. He has contributed to international courses on wood conservation in Norway, and has run short courses on building conservation in Australia, South Africa and New Zealand. He was convener of the Australia ICOMOS

working group that undertook major revisions to the Burra Charter in 1995–1999. He has chaired a Heritage Advisory Panel for the Port Arthur Historic Site and the New South Wales Heritage Council's Technical Advisory Group. He is a member of the Heritage Council of Victoria's Technical Advisory Committee. David is the author of the technical guide, *Salt Attack and Rising Damp: a guide to salt damp in historic and older buildings*, published by the heritage agencies of New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia and the City of Adelaide. He is currently preparing a technical guide on mortars and repointing of older buildings.

Anne Claoué-Long is an historian who currently works as an Associate at Godden Mackay Logan Heritage Consultants. She has worked in the museum and heritage fields for 15 years. Anne's experience in historic and heritage research and conservation projects includes significance assessment, conservation planning, heritage impact statements, interpretation, exhibitions and public programs. During her career Anne has worked for the Commonwealth and ACT Governments and in the private sector.


She has worked in heritage projects in various States and Territories, and on Australian Defence properties. She has particular expertise in the heritage of the ACT and region, and her particular area of interest is a
