#### Heritage Highlighted in the 2020 Tasmanian Architecture Awards

Tasmania's historic heritage has a strong presence amongst the entries for this year's Tasmanian Architecture Awards. Nine of the entries across three categories relate to well known heritage-listed sites CH Smith and Stillwater Seven in the north of the state, and Maylands Lodge, MOSS 39 and the Legislative Council Chambers in the south, as well as three residential properties. A further three entries are for residences that are listed on a local planning scheme or are appreciated by local communities for contributing to sense of place. Architects made their presentation to the jury earlier this month, and you can view the presentations via the Institute of Architects website. Please note the video runs for 6 hours and 43 minutes. Presentations on Maylands Lodge and Stillwater Seven start at approximately 1:12, and the Heritage Category from 12:10. We'll be running articles on the entries in this and future bulletins.

### Reworking everyday buildings

Tasmanian Heritage Council member Dr Stuart King explores how new work to small cottages dating from the 1830s, 1840s and 1950s have been reworked through exploration of the history, stories and fabric of the places. The cottages discussed include current 2020 Tasmanian Architecture Award entry Bozen's Cottage, by Taylor and Hinds Architects, past Award entry Captain Kelly's cottage, by John Wardle Architects, , and a non-heritage-listed former home of architect Dr Edith Emery.
